We are also incredibly grateful to be a part of the creation of 23 new funds since July 2011, which have been created and entrusted to the Foundation for the stewardship of carrying out these individuals' and families' dreams for the community.

How Grants Are Awarded

The Fremont Area Community Foundation gives grants for civic improvements, health and recreation, social services, arts and culture, and educational purposes in Fremont, Neb., and surrounding communities. Competitive grants are

made from the Foundation's Fremont Forever Fund and given from the Lester A. Walker Fund. According to the will of Lester A. Walker, 60 percent of the income from the Lester A. Walker Foundation is to be distributed in grants to the Fremont area through the Fremont Area Community Foundation.

To apply for a grant, organizations submit an application form with supporting documentation. Grant guidelines and application forms are available on the Foundation's website. The Grants Committee meets quarterly to review grant requests and make recommendations to the FACF Board of Directors for final approval.

During the past year, grants totaling \$301,692.25 were made from the FACF

and Lester A. Walker Fund. Since the Foundation was incorporated on Oct. 30, 1980 and through June 30, 2012, more than 1,600 grants totaling \$14,501,560 have been awarded. In the fall of 2012, the amount of grants awarded exceeded \$15 million. Including expenditures from grants, donor-advised funds, scholarships, and other funds, the Foundation supported the Fremont area with \$1,566,904 during the past fiscal year. All grants listed in this report were awarded between July 1, 2011 and June 30, 2012.

Radio Drama Camp Held at Fremont Opera House

Opportunities for arts and cultural activities are abundant in the Fremont area, and this past summer, Imaginarium, Inc. hosted the Imagine Fremont Radio Drama Camp at the Fremont Opera House. There were 22 students, 14 mentors and six adult volunteers who participated in the program. The Fremont Area Community Foundation gave a grant of \$2,500 toward the project.

The first portion of the camp was spent working on team-building exercises and drama games focused on getting participants comfortable working in front of others. The camp culminated in students being able to assign parts from an original script developed just for this project. They then moved into a more traditional rehearsal-type schedule, producing an hour-long program including all participants.

The target audience for the project consisted of three groups: parents, family and friends of the campers, teen mentors and camp participants. The program was targeted for students in fifth through eight grade and gave them experience in

personal artistic development, working as a team, and focusing on the larger effort for the benefit of an audience.


There was not only a great number of outgoing students who participated in the program, but there were also participants who were less sure of themselves. The participants also had very diverse socio-economic and ethnic backgrounds. Through the program, a supportive and cohesive team environment was created for all students.

The Fremont Opera House Board of Directors has expressed that their mission in this kind of endeavor is "the development of life skills in children through participation in the performing arts." Imaginarium, Inc. joined them in this mission to bring a program to the Opera House that was not only well-received by the audience, but it significantly enhanced each participant's self-confidence and self-esteem.

A total of \$27,500 was awarded in grants in the area of Arts and Culture.

Forging Fremont's Future - Community Visioning Project

At the Fremont Area Community Foundation, we have spent a great deal of time discussing our impact in the community now and forever. However, talking about the future of our organization cannot happen without thinking about the vision and future that exists within the community as a whole. This thinking, along with the momentum and collaboration of a group of dedicated leaders, led us to make a proactive grant in 2012 to provide funding for a facilitation process led by Dr. Roni Renter-Palmon and Ben Wigert at the University of Nebraska, Center for Collaboration Science, which has resulted in a vision for Fremont.

Data and research that had already been attained through the City's Comprehensive Plan update, Community Branding, and United Way Community Assessment and Report, along with demographic and economic data, were reviewed and used as a framework for the steering committee to get an understanding of the community today and the aspirations of citizens for the future.

A vision for the future, and an action plan in which to

accomplish it, in order to ensure that all members of the community have a high quality of life, is not a small task. It is one that requires dedication by leaders and a commitment to facing challenges head on. It is for those reasons that the following statements and small working teams were created around the areas of education, economic and business development, and quality of life.

Fremont is a place to grow. We are committed to being Nebraska's premier family-friendly community. Vibrant, attractive, affordable neighborhoods, progressive educational systems, and abundant recreational and cultural opportunities are cornerstones of our community. We strategically attract and expand businesses that create jobs and offer career opportunities that fuel our entrepreneurial spirit.

Fremont Public Schools Projector Project Completed

A four-year shared technology project of the Fremont Public School Foundation and the Fremont Public Schools has been completed. Digital projector technology is now available in each of the district's 236 core classrooms.

The digital projectors are the cornerstone of an upgrade to expand the application of technology for the improvement of student learning and teacher efficiency. The projectors, which allow images from teachers' computers to be projected, have become standard equipment for classrooms across the country. According to FPS Superintendent Dr. Steve Sexton, digital projectors open the door for a new generation of educational technology which cannot be accessed without them. He noted that "instructional materials increasingly come with CD-driven programs that require the use of a digital projector in order to deliver the materials to students."

Major outside funding for the project was provided by the

Fremont Area Community Foundation through a \$100,000 grant to the FPS Foundation, and the Fremont Alumni Association with a \$10,000 grant. Local PTA units also pitched in to provide projectors or comparable technology for their buildings. Sexton noted without the support of these organizations, this project could not have been completed, and that future help will be necessary to keep the Fremont Public Schools on the cutting edge of the rapidly-changing technology needs of today's schools. Sexton said providing the same level of technological exposure that students experience in neighboring suburban school districts poses a particular challenge.

The FPS Foundation Board of Directors is firmly committed to continuing to raise funds to support the growing technology needs of the District. "We want our Fremont students to be on a level playing field when they compete for college scholarships and jobs against students from other school districts."

Uehling Playground Project Completed

Through a combined effort of the Uehling Area Foundation, grants from the Fremont Area Community Foundation and Lower Elkhorn NRD, and many donors, new equipment was purchased and installed at the Uehling Park this past summer.

At first, the group envisioned a modest playground, but a picnic sponsored by WesTel changed their vision. They began to realize there may be more funding available but wanted to get a good start to show any other donors they were serious about the project.

After presenting the idea to several organizations, the project began to gain momentum. A grant of \$7,500 from the Fremont Area Community Foundation helped make the project possible.

It is conveniently located close to the smaller ball field so parents can watch a game while keeping an eye on their children playing on the equipment. The equipment provides a variety of challenging activities not found on any of the other playground equipment located in the park.

Summer Food Program Served More Than 6,300 Meals

"When I thought of hunger, I thought of Omaha or Lincoln, but that Friday when I went to help with the Summer Food Program my eyes were opened. There is a need in Fremont. My heart broke as I watched a young girl and her two younger brothers carefully wrap half of their burgers in napkins and put them in her purse. That image will remain with me. No child should have to worry about their next meal."

This past summer 20 area partner organizations came together to make sure that no child went hungry in the Fremont community. With 2011/2012 free- or reduced-lunch rates climbing to more than 54 percent at seven of Fremont's elementary and middle schools, and Washington Elementary School at 92.61 percent and Linden Elementary at 67.95 percent, the need for a food continuity program during the summer was not only clearly evident, it was critical.*

The Early Childhood Coalition, led by the Fremont Area United Way, Salvation Army, and the Presbyterian Church of Fremont, plans were quickly brought together to create a comprehensive program ready for the first day of summer vacation. From May 29–Aug. 10, for 11 weeks, dedicated volunteers served an average of 119 meals/day for a total of 6,320 meals served to children and families in need. Shuttle buses picked children up from three locations around the city to ensure that no one would be left behind.

The Fremont Area Community Foundation provided a proactive grant of \$5,000 in funding to help get the program established. "When Shawn Shanahan with the United Way came to us about this program, our board of directors was taken aback by the number of children in our community who are receiving free- or reduced-lunch rates during the school year. The idea that some children may go without a meal in our community was just unthinkable," said Jessica Janssen, foundation executive director. "We were impressed by the leadership of the organizations that came together to make this program a reality. The more we learned about the program, the more we knew we wanted to be a part of the solution."

Schilke-Novak Kids' Sports Trust Partners with FACF

Just south of Fremont, off of old Highway 275, the home of future summer nights filled with stolen bases and home runs is being constructed. As dirt is moved, footings poured, and sod laid, this could appear to be the site of any economic or residential development project, but that is not the case. This is the site of a character development, responsibility, endurance, and team-building project, where the youth of our community will learn some of their most valuable lessons and craft their most favorite memories.

Creation of the Schilke-Novak Kids' Sports Trust and supporting organization with the Fremont Area Community Foundation is the result of inspired action on a dream for the community. The supporting organization is a unique partnership with FACF that was new to the Foundation. The Foundation acts in stewardship to ensure the intent and purpose of the funds are carried out, with an appointment of four board members on the trust board, and also providing advice and expertise to the project.

The most visible purpose of the Trust is the creation of a new ballpark for the community to be managed by the Fremont Nighthawks. However, the passion of the donors extends beyond the physical facility, with provisions in the Trust for funding to ensure that underprivileged youth in the community can participate in athletic activities and compete with their peers. Neil and Bonnie Schilke have also ensured that the resources for the facility and for the program are provided for in perpetuity with the creation of two endowment funds.



New Component Funds Established

The term "fund" is used to describe an account within the Foundation created by the contributions of a particular donor or group of donors. Many of the component funds of the Foundation are permanent endowment funds. The principal is invested, and a percentage of the earnings is distributed in grants or scholarships each year. Other funds are special project or pass-through funds. Below are new funds that were established from the past fiscal year. Arlington Community Church Fund- Provides support to the Arlington Community Church to carry out its role and mission as described by its governing documents.

Mike Baker Memorial Scholarship

Fund- Supports graduating seniors or continuing education students who have attended high school in Dodge County or at DC West and are pursuing a degree in agriculture, natural resources, or other related field.

Bryson's Airboat Tours Donor-Advised Fund - Established to support charitable organizations that support children with disadvantages.

Cedar Bluffs Alumni Foundation Scholarship Fund -Provides for student scholarships for higher education for graduating seniors attending Cedar Bluffs Public Schools.

Christensen Corporation Donor-Advised Fund -Supports charitable organizations and projects that benefit the Fremont area community.

Community Development Field of Interest Fund -Provides support to community development initiatives that maintain a charitable purpose.

Fremont Area Alzheimer's Fund - Supports Alzheimer's research and provides education to caregivers and providers that maintain a charitable purpose.

Fremont Eye Associates Donor-Advised Fund – Provides support to local nonprofit organizations.

Fremont Women's Connection Fund – A fund established to hold funds for educational opportunities and events for the Fremont Women's Connection.

John C. Fremont Days Administrative Reserve Fund - Provide administrative, operational, and programming support to John C. Fremont Days, a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization.

Kelly Klosure Donor-Advised Fund – A fund established to support charitable organizations.

McClain Family Donor-Advised Fund – A fund established to support general charitable, philanthropic causes.

David and Sheila Monke Donor-Advised Fund - A fund established to support general charitable, philanthropic causes.

James L. Paulin Fremont Kiwanis Club Fund – Supports solely charitable activities of the Kiwanis Clubs and assists officers and members of the Kiwanis Youth Clubs attending state and national conventions.
