Offering Fremont Youth a Skilled Future

The new Fremont High School Career and Technical Education (CTE) Center is a far cry from your grandparents' shop class.

Instead of building a shelf or rebuilding a lawn mower machine, students are building a new house or performing maintenance on automobiles. Unveiled this fall, the CTE Center is preparing students to step into high-demand trade jobs upon graduation, building on the school's goal of preparing all students for a bright future.

Located on the northeast corner of the high school, the approximately 8,000-square-foot facility houses a welding/metal fabrication lab, automotive/diesel tech lab, construction/electricity lab, health occupation lab, CAD/CAM lab and robotics/automation lab. It also has a commons area, classroom and staff offices. A grant of \$35,000 from the Fremont Area Community Foundation helped outfit the automative/diesel tech lab with hand tools and

tool carts. And a second grant of \$20,000 is funding materials needed for the construction of walls being built by FHS students for a new Fremont Area Habitat for Humanity house.

A pilot program between FHS and the local Habitat chapter, students completed interior and exterior framing for Habitat for Humanity's latest house build at 423 N I St. The students will then put up the walls

and show Fremont Habitat officials their work before everything is broken down and moved to the property.

The goal of this joint project is to create an ongoing program in which students get real life, hands-on experience in construction tech, and Habitat benefits from additional volunteer labor.

This year, 173 guests dressed up in prom-like attire and were pampered with hair, makeup, nails, shoe shines, crowns and flowers. They dined in a safe, independent atmosphere with a volunteer buddy as their host. And the evening included limo rides, pictures, a grand red carpet entrance, music, dancing and karaoke.

The evening also offered a separate respite area for the care takers of the guests where they could relax, get a massage and enjoy fellowship with each other.

Variety is the Spice of...Giving!

When you're getting ready to make a contribution to a fund at the community foundation or other charity, don't automatically reach for your checkbook! Here are other (and typically more tax-savvy) options to consider.

Marketable securities

Gifts of long-term appreciated stock to a donor-advised or other type of fund at the community foundation is always one of the most tax-savvy ways to support favorite charitable causes because capital gains tax can be avoided. Gifts of publicly-traded stock, for example, are easy to transfer to a fund. The community foundation team can provide you and your clients with transfer instructions to make the process simple.

As is the case with a cash gift, the community foundation will provide a receipt for tax purposes, and the gift of stock will be valued at the shares' fair market value on the date of transfer. When the community

foundation sells the shares, the proceeds flow into your fund without any reduction for capital gains taxes. This is because the community foundation is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization and therefore does not pay income tax. That would not have been the case, however, if you had sold the stock first and then transferred the proceeds to your fund; you would owe capital gains tax on the sale. Especially in cases where you have held the stock a long time and it's gone up significantly in value, the capital gains hit can be big.

QCDs from IRAs

As always, keep in mind that the Qualified Charitable Distribution ("QCD") is a very smart way to support charitable causes. If you are over the age of 70 ½, you can direct up to \$105,000 (in 2024) from your IRA to certain charities, including a field-of-interest, designated, unrestricted, or scholarship fund at the community foundation. If you are subject to the rules for Required

Minimum Distributions (RMDs), QCDs count toward those RMDs. That means you avoid income tax on the funds distributed to charity. Plus, keep in mind that leaving your IRA to your fund through a beneficiary designation is a very tax savvy move, so be sure to discuss this option with our team and your tax advisors.

Life Insurance

Don't overlook life insurance as an effective charitable giving tool, whether by naming your fund at the community foundation as the beneficiary or, in the case of whole life policies, naming the fund as beneficiary and transferring the policy itself. If you transfer a policy, you may be able to make annual, tax-deductible contributions to the community foundation to cover the premiums.





Our 2024 Grantees

Since 1980, over \$38 million in grants have been awarded from the Fremont Forever Fund, Donor-Advised Funds, scholarships and other funds administered by the Fremont Area Community Foundation. This past year alone, the foundation has awarded over \$3.6 million in these categories. Listed below are competitive grants awarded so far this year from the Fremont Forever Fund, the Lester A. Walker Fund, the Fremont Forever Friends' funds and Field of Interest funds.

American Cancer Society-Dodge County Relay for Life—\$1,500 to help promote the annual event.

Aspire for Greatness—\$25,000 for after-school programs.

Arlington Public Schools—\$7,500 to provide basic needs for students.
